Maths

Information for Parents:

This week we will be focusing on a range of money problems. The children will be working through different money problems including choosing and matching coins, finding total amounts, calculating change and converting between pounds and pence. Below are examples of some of the methods your child should be familiar with from work in class. These are a reminder of the different ways to solve the addition, subtraction and multiplication money calculations within the lessons and tasks given in the daily activities for this week.

Column Addition:

£12.50 + £ 7.50 £20.00

Column Subtraction:


£1.45 - 28p £5.00 - £1.35
£ 1.
3
 4 5 £ 4 8 9 1 0 - £ 1 . 3 5
£ 1 . 1 7 £ 3 . 6 5

Number lines:

£1.57 +£0.36= £1.93 is the same as 157p + 36p= 193p



£7.23 - £2.39 = £4.84 is the same as 723p - 239p = 484p



Partitioning and Grid method for Multiplication:

 $5 \times £1.23 = £6.15$ is the same as $5 \times 123p = 615p$

Remember to convert between pounds (£) and pence (p) if it helps but choose the correct way to write the final answer - and don't forget to put the decimal point in the right place:

£3.90 =
$$390p$$

$$27p = £0.27$$

$$105p = £1.05$$

£4.50 =
$$450p$$

Finally, use the 0 in the correct position as the place holder:

£3.90 =
$$390p$$

$$27p = £0.27$$

£4.50 =
$$450p$$

Information for Parents:

This week we will be writing the middle and end of the story set in an 'imaginary world'.

Task 1

Think about what could happen in the imaginary world you have created. Does the main character meet someone in the new world? Like Lucy meets Mr Tumnus or Edward meets the White Witch.

Does something have to be found in the imaginary world so that the characters can return to the real world?

Is there some sort of test, competition or battle?

Now write one or two paragraphs to describe this event. Make it exciting by building tension. Use descriptive words and a range of sentences to build tension and excitement.

Remember, several short sentences can build tension well and add drama. Longer sentences can be descriptive and build a detailed picture for the reader.

Think about what the main character or characters are thinking and feeling.

Task 2

Today's task is to finish the middle or main part of your story. You need to think about how the exciting event, adventure, meeting etc. comes to an end. Does the battle finish?

Is the special object found?

Do the characters become friends with people from the imaginary world? Now write the last paragraph of this middle/main part of the story.

Think about what the reader need to know. Have you explained what has happened in enough detail?

If your writing for Task 1 or Task 2 includes a conversation remember to use inverted commas correctly. "______,"

Task 3

Read through the story so far and check punctuation, spellings and that each sentence makes sense.

Now think about the ending of the story. Write a final paragraph to explain what happens to the characters.

Do they find their way back home?

Do they decide to stay in the imaginary world?

Have the characters learnt a valuable lesson?

Grammar

Learn:

This week the grammar skills involve the <u>irregular</u> verb spellings when using the past tense. You will be continuing your story in the past tense so make sure you read it back and check you have used the correct form of the verb in each sentence.

Regular verb endings:

When verbs are written in the past tense they often end in -ed.

If the word already ends in an e then you just need to add a -d.

For example: free = freed, agree = agreed

However, this is not always the rule. Sometimes the word completely changes. These are the <u>irregular</u> verb spellings you will be using for the units below.

For example: run = ran read=read think=thought fall=fell


Classification keys:

Last week we looked at grouping animals into 2 sub-groups called vertebrates and invertebrates. You then found out about the different sub-groups within the 'invertebrates' group.

This week you are going to draw some <u>classification keys</u> that help to identify particular animals by using their characteristics through a series of questions that require a yes/no answer.

Eventually, it should be possible to find out what the specific animal is.

Look at the example below:






Now think about drawing some classification keys of your own. There are some below for you to use as a starting point. You could extend each classification key by asking another question to create another yes/no option.
