Thursday	Today the focus will be on dividing with remainders again so that you can master the skill.  Complete the lesson:  national curriculum>year 5 booster> multiplication and division>interpreting remainders  Then complete the homework activity.
Friday	Today the focus will be on dividing numbers ending in zeroes. Use your times tables knowledge to help you. See example below.  36,000 divided by 6.  First divide 36 by 6 (think about your 6x tables - how many 6s go in to 36)  36 divided by 6 = 6  Now look at the number of zeroes (there are 3 in 36,000) so write those in your answer. 36,000 divided by 6 = 6,000.  Have a go on IXL today: E9

## Writing

### Information for Parents:

This week we will be focusing on writing direct speech/dialogue using inverted commas (speech marks) and using the correct punctuation. It would be useful for you to go through this with children to remind them and to practice.

Using different words (synonyms) for 'said' and adverbs for how characters talk when writing dialogue is a simple way to up level the sentence. See examples below.



Adverbs - focus on using the 'how' adverbs this week.

# Speech

Write each sentence in your book, identifying what is speech and ensuring that the four key rules are met such as it being punctuated accurately.

- 1) my favourite colour is red said the little boy.
- leave it over there said the man. Ok replied the delivery man. No not there, over there said the man pointing over to the corner.
- 3) are we there yet moaned the children.
- 4) The fans shouted come on City

- Fluency:

  1) Explain the four key rules of punctuating speech, using an example to demonstrate what you mean.
- For each of the sentences in practise, find another word that could replace the word that shows something is being said e.g. instead of asked you could use questioned.
- Create three sentences that use speech in them, using a different word other than said each time.

- Reasoning:

  1) Explain why an author might decide to write all of someone's speech in capital letters.
- Always, sometimes, never? You can use a full stop at the end of speech. Explain your reasoning.
- Which piece of punctuation is most commonly used to close speech? Why?
- 4) What two ways are used to show inverted commas? Why do you think this is? Try to find examples in books that do you think this show either way.

### Task 2 Today, write a conversation between two characters/people. You could write a conversation that you've had with a family member or you could choose your favourite story and continue a conversation between the characters.

### Remember to include:

- New speaker, new line.
- Capital letter when speech starts
- Inverted commas

"Today, you have to use lots of synonyms for said," Catherine insisted.

Punctuation marks (, .!?) go inside the inverted commas as in my example above.

### Task 3

Watch this short video animation 'I lived on the moon'. It is the  $5^{th}$  animation when you click on the link.

Rewrite the story focusing on including direct speech. What what the boy and the other characters say to each other? You might want to stop the video at 1:30 where the boy sits by the tree (it is actually a giant ocean ray that takes the boy on his journey).

What conversation would they have?

Think about what they would ask each other using who, what, why, where, how.


### Science
