Please note that any links to internet sites and YouTube videos need to be supervised by an adult, and they may contain adverts. You do not need to pay for any of the sites we are suggesting.





| <p>Can you make your own wind chime? Decorate a plastic cup. Next you need to put some beads on your thread, and hang them from different parts of the cup. If you add some small bells, it will make a lovely sound, but old keys work really well too! Finally find somewhere to hang your wind chime.. if you need any resources please contact the school!</p>  | <p>Can you make some nature rubbings? Go for a walk in the park and find anything you can to bring home. Put the sticks, twigs, leaves and stones underneath a piece of paper. It needs to be on a hard surface! Gently, using a pencil or some crayons, rub over the top of the object. See what patterns turn up!</p>  | <p>Can you make your own instrument to play? Use some elastic bands and an old box of tissues or plastic plate to create your guitar. If you want to be really professional, you could even try and make your own pick. See what other instruments you can make at home and start your own band!</p>  |

| <p>Can you find all the words that have the ay sound in this story? Talk about the spellings with your grown up – are they the same or different?</p> <p>Kate works in the nursery. One sunny day she went to the park. She was going to play on the swings. On her way, she saw some of the children from her class. She said "Hello, how are you doing?" All of the children shouted 'Great!'</p> | <p>We call the words in a song 'lyrics'. Can you write your own song lyrics to go along with the music you play on your instrument? If you wanted to, you could try and make it rhyme, or you could choose a song you already know and write the lyrics down. I wonder what you will come up with...</p> <p><i>Let it go, let it go.....</i></p> | <p>Each week we will be creating a maths PowerPoint that will support your child's learning. These will be emailed each week. There are 5 days of lessons to complete. It is important to read through the slides to familiarise yourself with the learning before you work through it with your child.</p> |
