

# Pupil Premium Strategy 2018-21

### **Reviewed and Updated September 2020**

Schools receive a Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) funding of £1,320 per pupil which is for educational provision within the school. Money is allocated to the school for children whose families have registered for Free School Meals (FSM). This includes any child that has been registered for FSM at any stage during the last six years. Schools also receive money for looked after children.

At Walnut Tree Walk Primary School we strive to ensure that:

- Teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all our pupils, irrespective of gender, ethnicity or class
- The needs of Pupil Premium pupils are well met through additional support and provision which enables them to make best possible progress
- The all-round education, health and well-being of our children is of paramount importance

### Addressing barriers to learning

Barriers to learning for our Pupil Premium students include:

- Attainment on entry to the EYFS is typically significantly below the national average.
- Walnut Tree Walk is in the top 20% of all schools for the proportion of pupils with English as an additional Language at 49.1%.
- Walnut Tree Walk is in the top 20% of all schools for the proportion of disadvantaged pupils at 40.8%.
- 15.1% of pupils have an SEN Support Plan and 2.5% have an EHCP.
- The school deprivation indicator is 0.3 placing it in the highest 20% of all schools.

• Therefore, Walnut Tree Walk Primary School is in the top quintile of schools nationally for pupils with English as an additional language, pupils eligible for pupil premium and deprivation indicator.

To address any barriers to learning for disadvantaged children, we have identified the following priorities for Pupil Premium spending over the next 3 years:

### Impact of spending

The Senior Leadership Team and Governing Body closely monitor how we use our Pupil Premium Funding to ensure that it is having an impact on the attainment, progress and wellbeing of eligible pupils. We carefully monitor and track the progress of individual pupils so that support and interventions can be put in place for children who need it. Pupil Premium Funding and the impact of this is a regular item on the governors' Curriculum, Standards and Inclusion committee.

The impact of the 2019-20 spending cannot be measured due to Covid-19 and the school closure period meaning that there is no internal assessment data or end of Key Stage SATs results.

### Impact of 2018-19 Spending

Our 2019 cohort of Pupil Premium children made exceptional progress throughout their time at Walnut Tree Walk. The progress scores for our disadvantaged children were significantly above the national average (National average score is 0), and were as follows:

- Reading +2.6
- Writing +3.9
- Maths +4.5

The percentage of Pupil Premium children achieving the expected standard or above in Year 6 was as follows:

- Reading 73% (national average for all pupils = 73%)
- Writing 73% (national average for all pupils = 78%)
- Maths 73% (national average for all pupils = 79%)

We raised the average scaled score for disadvantaged children from 100 in 2018 to 101 in 2019 for Reading, and from 102 to 104 in Maths.

The percentage of Pupil Premium children working at the expected standard or above in each year group increased over the academic year as follows, narrowing these gaps. Year 6: Reading by 15%, Writing by 23%, Maths by 15% Year 5: Reading by 4%, Writing by 9%, Maths by 9% Year 4: Reading by 9% Year 3: Reading by 5%, Writing by 9%, Maths by 18% Year 2: Reading by 15%, Writing by 22%, Maths by 36%

The percentage of Pupil Premium children working at Greater Depth increased for Reading in Years 5 and 3, for Writing in Years 6, 5, 4, 3 and 2, and for Maths in Year 5, 4, 3 and 2.

# Impact of 2017-18 Spending

The percentage of Pupil Premium children working at the expected standard or above in each year group increased over the academic year as follows, narrowing these gaps. Year 6: Reading by 7%, Writing by 16%, Maths by 15%

Year 5: Maths by 8%

Year 4: Reading by 19%, Maths by 29%

Year 3: Reading by 5%, Writing by 6%

Year 2: Reading by 53%, Writing by 22%, Maths by 31%

The percentage of Pupil Premium children working at Greater Depth increased for Reading in Years 5 and 3, for Writing in Years 6 and 5, and for Maths in Year 5.

Attainment for PP children at the end of KS2 increased from the previous year in Reading from 52% to 63%. Maths increased from 74% to 75%, and Writing attainment was slightly lower.

The gap between our disadvantaged children and all non-disadvantaged children nationally has significantly reduced in reading, and in Maths our disadvantaged children perform in line with the national for non-disadvantaged.
